Brown Act: The legislative body of a local agency may use teleconferencing in connection with any meeting or proceeding authorized by law. Cal. Gov't Code § 54953(b)(1). A "teleconference" is "a meeting of a legislative body, the members of which are in different locations, connected by electronic means, through either audio or video, or both." Cal. Gov't Code § 54953(b)(4). A local agency may provide the public with additional teleconference locations. Cal. Gov't Code § 54953(b)(4).

- (1) it must comply with all of the Act's requirements applicable to other meetings;
- (2) all votes must be taken by roll call;

- (4) each teleconference location must be identified in the notice and agenda and each location must be accessible to the public;
- (5) during the teleconferenced meeting, at least a quorum of the members of the legislative body must participate from locations within the boundaries of the body's jurisdiction; and
- (6) the agenda must provide the public with an opportunity to address the legislative body at each teleconference location. Cal. Gov't Code § 54953(b).

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DRAFT MINUTES

NLS Executive Committee Meeting

August 25, 2022

- 1. Welcome and Roll Call Chair, Mark Fink, Yolo County, called the meeting to order at 1:08 p.m. Also present were NLS Executive Committee members: Christopher Cooper, Humboldt County; Deb Fader Samson, Mendocino County; Christopher Platt, Mono County; Anthony Halstead, Napa County; Nick Wilczek, Nevada County; Narinder Sufi, Butte County; and Jennifer Baker, Benicia. Also attending were NLS fiscal and administrative support, Carol Frost, Pacific Library Partnership; and Jacquie Brinkley, NLS/Pacific Library Partnership.
- 2. Public Invited to Comment Lindsay Fuchs, Plumas County Library was in attendance.
- Approval of Consent Calendar Motion to approve the Consent Calendar
 Olawski moved; Fader Samson seconded. Vote taken by roll call; all votes in favor, motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Old Business
 - A. OverDrive Reciprocal Lending Agreement

Platt presented and reviewed the Library-to-Go memo to recommend approval of the Reciprocal Lending Agreement through OverDrive with MARINet and Peninsula Library System, and noted that the recommendation to establish a conservative baseline amount at \$45,000 per year outside of the platform fees. Platt stated that he will confirm the start date as soon as the Agreement is signed, and that an FAQ document will be drafted for NLS libraries.

Motion to approve the OverDrive Reciprocal Lending Agreement with a baseline amount for Library to Go at \$45,000 per year, not including the platform fee.

Baker moved; Wilczek seconded. Vote taken by roll call; all votes in favor, motion passed unanimously.



B. Revised Strategic Priorities

Fink presented the revised Strategic Priorities document and noted that new language was added to Tier 2 to reflect the findings and recommendations of the CLSA Study that was recently completed and emphasizes education and training for NLS members.

Frost thanked the Ad Hoc Committee for creating this road map for NLS that provides clarity around important topics and noted that this document will be presented to the Administrative Council at the Mid-Year meeting for adoption. Frost asked Fink if the Committee had identified activities to support the values and priorities.

Fink suggested that the Committee could identify measurable goals to track progress and added that the Committee could develop milestones and timelines for those activities. Fink invited suggestions from the Executive Committee.

Platt suggested that the Committee start with Tier 1 and identify working groups from among all NLS members to get others involved.

Fink suggested that working groups be created after the Administrative Council adopts the Strategic Priorities in January 2023. Olawski and all other Executive Committee members agreed to this approach.

Motion to adopt the revised NLS Strategic Priorities as presented and to take to the Administrative Council for adoption and to create a new Ad Hoc Committee from the NLS Administrative Council to develop the benchmarks and timelines.

Olawski moved; Fader Samson seconded. Vote taken by roll call; all votes in favor, motion passed unanimously.

5. New Business

A. Consideration of Kanopy and Filmocracy as Shared Resources

Platt invited Fuchs to present on the findings of this research.

Fuchs reviewed the findings as presented in the memo outlining details of Kanopy and Filmocracy as possible shared resources for NLS and based on survey responses over recent years from NLS members requesting streaming services as shared resource options.

Although Kanopy in its current set-up is not eligible for CLSA funds for NorthNet, Fuchs will be sending out further information to the NLS directors about tiered discounted



pricing which Kanopy is offering NorthNet. NLS will continue to monitor Kanopy and OverDrive so once their technical abilities match the CLSA requirements for a shared collection, NLS can further discuss the potential about using CLSA funds and how individualized caps, parameters, and so on can work as a group product.

NLS may consider surveying its members regarding their interest in Filmocracy. If at least three libraries are interested in the product, it can be brought to the NLS Administrative Council at the January 2023 meeting to approve a new shared subscription. This will allow NLS sufficient time to negotiate a contract and set the product up for July 2023, and to add this to the NLS CLSA Claim Form. It should be noted that any new shared subscription will be subject to the 5% administrative fee approved by the Council.

Fuchs noted that both vendors offer demos on request, but NLS may consider setting up one or two demos with each vendor and sending the invitation to all NLS libraries. Individual libraries are also able to pursue Filmocracy using local funding during 2022-2023.

Fuchs will continue to review other potential video streaming services that can use local and/or CLSA funding for information gathering on behalf of individual libraries and NorthNet.

Fuchs noted that Plumas County Library will be entering into contract soon with Filmocracy.

Wilczek asked if Filmocracy offers an offline viewing option. Fuchs confirmed that neither Filmocracy nor Kanopy offer offline viewing options.

Platt asked if Filmocracy offers viewing for library programs. Fuchs confirmed that libraries can host events around individual films and would obtain permission from Flimocracy with no additional licensing fee.

Baker noted that Benicia was looking to add Kanopy now and asked if they would be eligible for the discount at this time or should they wait until the new fiscal year. Baker also asked if the discount offered was year to year, or cumulative. Fuchs confirmed that any NLS library signing up with Kanopy now will receive the discount beginning November 1, 2022 (need to identify that they are an NLS library) and that the discount is in perpetuity and will grow annually with additional membership.

Frost noted that any Kanopy contract is not with NLS but with individual NLS libraries.



B. Review Choices for FY 2022-23 NLS CLSA Claim Form and Consider Development of Ad Hoc Group for Changes

Fink reviewed the memo regarding the NLS CLSA Claim Form and members' request to revise this form to alleviate confusion. Fink noted the following items are recommended for removal and one item to add:

Remove:

- Additional funds towards NLS Library-to-Go Shared eMagazine Collection
- To purchase software which supports curbside pick-up, for either your primary or one of your primary methods of delivery of material to patrons (added for pandemic has not been claimed)
- For three or more libraries to jointly purchase remote reference software, such as ZenDesk (added for pandemic - has not been claimed)

Add:

 eBooks-for-All Palace project (if purchasing titles to be shared with other libraries)

NLS Directors also requested to add the Palace Project as an option, as it is now confirmed to be CLSA eligible if shared among three or more libraries.

Motion to modify/revise the NLS CLSA Claim Form as articulated in memo and to appoint a Task Force at the January Mid-Year Administrative Council meeting for further revision of the Claim Form.

Platt moved; Halstead seconded. Vote taken by roll call; all votes in favor, motion passed unanimously.

Baker asked if the Palace Project option could be included in #8 (of the current Claim Form) as an "Other eResource".

Frost confirmed that the Palace Project could be included in Other eResources, and will be detailed as "Palace Project" to distinguish from other options in this item.

C. Scope of Work and Contract for CLSA Study Consultant

Fink presented the memo regarding additional work requested by the Administrative Council on the CLSA Study. Additional work requested on this Study includes the following:



Consultant will conduct an analysis for the Executive Committee to review that would divide the CSLA funds available so that:

- 50% of funds are allocated to each library
- 25% of funds go to lowest service population size
- 25% of funds go to the most geographically isolated libraries

Consultant will conduct an analysis for the Executive Committee to review that would divide the CLSLA funds equally so that:

- 1/3 of funds are allocated to each library
- 1/3 of funds go to the lowest service population size
- 1/3 of funds go to the most geographically isolated libraries

Consultant will provide a narrative to explain the distribution and determination of the categories. Formulas from the previous study will be included as comparison to the new formulas.

Discussion ensued regarding definitions for geographically isolated and lowest service population.

Frost clarified that the CLSA definition was used for geographically isolated and population was included in the appendices of the original CLSA Study.

Baker asked how the funds would be distributed within the lowest population libraries, if all receive the same amount should they qualify for "lowest population" with a threshold determined by NLS or the Consultant, or if allocation of funds would be tiered.

Discussion ensued regarding how to distribute funds among the lowest population libraries. A suggestion was made to request that the Consultant's analysis could include options such as making tiers, such as 10,000 people, 20,000 people, with each tier receiving either a fixed or variable amount. Other ideas included using a reverse pro-rated amount or to use budget per capita.

Fink stated that the Administrative Council had emphasized equity when considering any option regarding the allocation of CLSA funds.

Discussion ensued regarding the value of requesting additional study and if the outcome would significantly change what has been presented in the Study to date.



Fink agreed that various options do not significantly change overall amounts for individual libraries, and he prefers to use the funds to directly support the libraries that are most under resourced.

Motion to approve the Scope of Work with Library Solutions to review new formula options for CLSA funding with a contract not to exceed \$10,000. The NLS Chair will work with NLS staff to clarify what calculations Library Solutions will develop.

Baker moved; Wilczek seconded. Vote taken by roll call; all votes in favor, motion passed unanimously.

Olawski requested that the new formula options be added to the Study Summary Chart.

D. Appointment of Anthony Halstead as NLS Chair and Nomination of a new Vice-Chair Fink announced his resignation from NLS Chair position due to his pending relocation to become the Director of Anythink Libraires in Colorado. With Fink's resignation, per NLS Bylaws, the Vice-Chair assumes the Chair position to fulfill the term of the Chair. The term will continue through June 30, 2024. Halstead agreed to assume the Chair position effective immediately.

Halstead asked for nominations or volunteers from the Executive Committee to take the Vice-Chair role. There were no volunteers.

NO ACTION TAKEN: Since this was an Action Item, it is deferred until the Administrative Council meeting of January 2023 where nominations will be sought for the Vice-Chair position.

Brinkley noted that with Fink's departure from the Executive Committee, NBCLS will have 4 members, MVLS will have 2 members, and NSCLS will have 2 members. The replacement for Executive Committee member Fink (MVLS) ideally should be nominated from NSCLS or MVLS in an effort to equitably represent all NLS regions.

Background

The NLS Administrative Council, at their June 2022 Annual Meeting, requested that the contract with Library Solutions for the CLSA Study be amended to expand the results of the Study's final report and to include additional CLSA formula options for review and consideration.

At the August NLS Executive Committee meeting, the Committee approved up to \$10,000 for a contract with Library Solutions to consider additional models for CLSA allocations that would divide the CSLA funds available, including models that address:

- 50% of funds allocated for each library, 25% of funds go to the lowest service population size, 25% of funds go to the rural geographically isolated libraries, and a narrative to explain the distribution and determination of categories;
- 1/3 of funds allocated to each library, 1/3 of funds go to the lowest service population size, 1/3 of funds go to the most geographically isolated libraries, and a narrative to explain the distribution and determination of categories;
- Define and explain lowest population size;
- Recommend alternate options in addition to requested formulas

Attached is the report provided by Library Solutions. The original report contained five options. The report attached continues with that enumeration, with the additional reports commencing with Option #6.

Discussion

The original report was presented to the NLS Administrative Council at the June 2022 meeting. At that meeting, Chair Olawski presented the item, noting that that current CLSA allocation formula (Option #1 in the report) was favored by 70% of the NLS membership who had responded that the current formula was working well.

Some members expressed a desire to see some alternative models with a focus on the geographically isolated libraries, stating this would be of great value and benefits the most in need. One member expressed that, rather than selecting the Option that benefits all or most members, the Council may consider an option that benefits the most in need.

The Council approved Option #1 to be used for the FY 2022-23 budget.



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Recommendation

It is recommended that the Executive Committee consider the additional options put forth in this study and consider a recommendation of one to the NLS Administrative Council.

The Executive Committee may also consider presenting all options to the NLS Administrative Council, and emailing out the report well in advance of the January Administrative Council meeting, so that members may have ample time to consider the options.

The Executive Committee may consider holding a discussion at the January meeting, and holding a vote at the June 2023 meeting. In this scenario, should another formula be adopted, it would need to be determined if it would be effective for the FY 2023-24 budget or the FY 2024-25 budget.

Library Solutions, September 2022

Background

NorthNet is a Northern California multi-type library consortium comprised of forty public library jurisdictions, one academic library and one law library. Only NorthNet public library members were considered in this study, as the California Library Services Act (CLSA) and its funding only apply to public libraries. The public library members are Alpine County, Belvedere-Tiburon, Benicia, Butte County, Colusa County, Del Norte County, El Dorado County, Folsom, Humboldt County, Lake County, Larkspur, Lassen County, Lincoln, Marin County, Mendocino County, Mill Valley, Modoc County, Mono County, Napa County, Nevada County, Orland, Placer County, Plumas County, Roseville, Sacramento, St. Helena, San Anselmo, San Rafael, Sausalito, Shasta County, Siskiyou County, Solano County, Sonoma County, Sutter County, Tehama County, Trinity County, Willows, Woodland, Yolo County, and Yuba County.

NorthNet is a joint powers authority created in 2009 by combining three existing cooperative systems: Mountain Valley Library System, North Bay Cooperative Library System, and North State Cooperative Library System. This was part of an effort supported by the CLSB and the State Library to consolidate library systems throughout the state, to achieve greater efficiencies and economies of scale. Members of these three legacy systems now receive their CLSA funding through NorthNet, but the systems maintain their separate existences and memberships, and still meet and make decisions about cooperative programs.

NLS member libraries requested a study to provide options to allocate funds and the findings of the study were submitted in a report to NLS in April 2022 with suggested formulas to allocate the CLSA funds. The study was carried out as follows:

- A survey was given to the eight other California cooperative library systems, to gather overall information about how they use and manage their CLSA funding.
- A questionnaire was administered to NorthNet member library directors (or a designee). This
 questionnaire was designed to determine any benefits and challenges related to NorthNet's
 current CLSA processes.
- One-on-one interviews were conducted with a subset of NorthNet library directors (chosen by the NorthNet Chair and Vice Chair), to gather in-depth information, perspectives and ideas regarding allocation and use of CLSA funding.
- Additional data points were reviewed, including NorthNet historical documentation such as surveys, claim forms, memos, and formula spreadsheets.

Member libraries reviewed the report and determined they wanted more options with the goal to create equity, the libraries with the smallest resources will receive larger allocations.

Addendum- Alternate Options for Allocation Formulas

The Consultant was tasked with the following:

- 50% of funds are allocated for each library, 25% of funds go to the lowest service population size, 25% of funds go to the rural geographically isolated libraries, and a narrative to explain the distribution and determination of categories;
- 1/3 of funds are allocated to each library, 1/3 of funds go to the lowest service population size, 1/3 of funds go to the most geographically isolated libraries, and a narrative to explain the distribution and determination of categories;
- Define and explain lowest population size;

Consultant will recommend alternate options in addition to requested formulas.

Formula Process

The first step in the process was to define what determines a low or small population size. There are different definitions of what determines a small population and there is no consensus on the best metric. The National Academies of Sciences stated small populations are "the size, dispersion, or accessibility of the population of interest makes it difficult to obtain adequate sample sizes to test specific research questions." The research did not specify a number to define small populations. The Census states small towns as incorporated areas with 5,000 residents or fewer define small populations. Some studies stated any area less than 50,000 was considered small.

For the purpose of this report, lowest population size was determined by using two metrics. Using 5,000 provided funding to only one library system, Alpine County. Using 10,000 provided funding to only four library systems. The intent was to consider how to allocate funds with the greatest impact. The Consultant used 20,000 and 50,000 as benchmarks for allocations. Each category (20,000 and 50,000) was further broken down to only include rural and also all populations.

A table is included to briefly describe the 11 (eleven) formulas presented in this report. The formulas can be found in Appendices A, B and E.

Using options 6A and 6B in Appendix A, two allocation formulas were created that provided funding to only rural libraries with populations of 20,000 or less (7 libraries) and all libraries in NLS with populations of 20,000 or less (13 libraries), using 50% - 25%- 25% split. Options 6C and 6D allocated funds based on populations of 50,000 or less.

Options 7A to 7D in Appendix B used the same metrics but illustrates the 1/3 - 1/3 - 1/3 split. Again, two examples for each population, creating four options.

The formulas from the original study are in Appendix C to make comparisons.

Appendix D is a summary of options from the original report.

Appendix E includes three options created by the Consultant. Using the two requested splits (50%-25%-25% and 1/3-1/3-1/3), the Consultant created allocation formulas using the percentage of library budgets used for collection development. According to the California State Library-Public Library Statistics-Fiscal Year 2020/2021-Library Expenditures-Total Operating Expenditures on Collection. The median percentage is 7.32, average is 7.74, maximum is 18.50, and minimum is 1.04. The consultant used the average total operating expenditures on collection. Option 8A is the result of allocating 50%-25%-25% split of funds to all libraries of 50,000 population or less with collection expenditures of 7.74 or less. Option 8B is the result of allocating 1/3 -1/3-1/3 split of funds to all libraries of 50,000 population or less with collection expenditures of 7.74 or less.

It was determined to use the collection metric as CLSA funds are for resource sharing. Allocating funds to those libraries that have lower spending levels will hopefully increase their percentage of spending on collection development. The intent of this model attempted to create the ability to increase funding to share their collections within the cooperative.

Option 9 is a 50%-50% split allocation formula. All libraries will have an equal portion of 50% of CLSA funds and libraries with collection budgets of 7.74 or less to split 50% equally. This model provides more funds to be allocated to libraries that do not have the ability to spend on collection development at a level that is considered average for California libraries. It also uses a metric from the California State Library reporting.

Various formulas created similar models. There are many possible scenarios, but the allocation of funds become very close within libraries. One metric is library budgets. Library budgets can be misleading. Large budgets may be the result of staffing needs, facility maintenance, or various local costs. This could result in lower discretionary money for collections.

Appendix F is the updated population figures for 2021-22. To maintain comparable data, the Consultant used the same figures from the original report (2020-2021) for the formulas in this report.

Description of Formula Allocations

The following table is a description of the 11 formulas developed to illustrate the various scenarios using the metrics listed above and alternate options created by the Consultant:

Plan of Service Objective Evaluation

1. Were the System goals for the Communications and Delivery Program met through the ongoing CLSA funding? Please, explain. How did the community benefit? Did you complete all the funding objectives described in your Plan of service; if not, why?

The goals for the NorthNet Library System (NLS) Communication and Delivery programs were met through the ongoing CLSA funding. NLS completed all the funding objections described in the Plan of Service.

The NorthNet Library System distributes its CLSA funds back to the libraries, for them to choose to use the funds for shared courier delivery services, a shared eMagazine collection, a shared OverDrive collection, local shared OverDrive collections among 3 or more libraries, broadband hardware, and Link+.

Shared e-resources remain a priority for all members, especially those in smaller, more geographically remote areas. The Library-to-Go consortium-shared OverDrive eBook, eMagazine, and eAudio collection which can be accessed 24/7 through a custom library portal continues to be popular with NLS patrons. Each library builds their individual library collection from the OverDrive catalog of more than 3.3 million titles in 100+ languages from over 5,000 publishers and shared the collection with the other NLS participating libraries. In FY 2021-2022, the total OverDrive circulation among 27 member library systems totaled 1.1 million items. In addition, the monthly average of new users joining OverDrive increased in FY 2021-22 to 1,526 (from 1,200/month in FY 2020-2021) and indicates continued high demand as more library patrons have been converted to Library-to-Go users since the pandemic. Libraries participating in the NLS Library-to-Go OverDrive consortium use a combination of CLSA C&D funds as well as investing local resources to support this service.

NLS also has a shared eMagazine collection through OverDrive. The shared eMagazine collection circulation among 23 member library systems totaled 80,687 items.

NLS has delivery contracts with two courier services, funded with a combination of CLSA and local funds, which moves physical materials among two thirds of the NLS member libraries. Remote libraries that are not served by contract delivery vendors, primarily in the North State region, use the US Postal Service and/or UPS and are reimbursed for their costs.

Seventeen (17) NLS libraires offer Link+ services to their communities. The shared contract is saving NLS participating libraries nearly \$17,000 annually. Seven (7) NLS libraries allocated \$42,776 towards Link+.

Five (5) member libraries allocated \$37,461 of CLSA funds to help cover their CENIC costs. One member library allocated CLSA funds to support their Broadband hardware costs, now allowable under C&D permitted expenditures.

2. How much has been spent of the System's funding for the FY 2021/22? If not all the funds have been spent, are you on track to expend funds by June 2024; please explain. (Be specific answer should reflect all the programs approved per Plans of Service)

The FY 2021-22 Plan of Service included the following categories which were underspent:

Local Costs: Office Supplies, Postage, Websites, Zoom, Communications

Budgeted FY 2021-22 funds: \$5,050 Expended: \$3,116. The \$1,934 remaining will be carried over to FY 2022-23. Unexpended funds due to lower supplies costs due to pandemic.

OverDrive, Zinio, Link+, Broadband and Other from the approved Menu of Services
Budgeted FY 2021-22 funds: \$651,038. Unexpended funds to roll over for FY 2022-23: \$92,428.
Unexpended funds are due to 1) As noted in the Plan of Service, \$50,000 was earmarked for future purchases, and none were purchased, and 2) under-purchasing from the shared Library-to-Go collection due to the Committee re-writing collection development policies.

Total amount to be carried over for FY 2022-23: \$94,362.

NorthNet is on track to expend the funds by June 2024.

3. If you used CLSA funding from previous fiscal years (rollover) as part of your FY 2021-22 budget, please, list below which fiscal year the funding is from, the amount, the intended purpose/goal of the funding per the Board approved Plan of Service, and the reason the funds were not spent in the FY approved by the Board?

The budget included \$36,817 of FY 2020-21 funds, which was allocated to the "OverDrive, Zinio, Link+, Broadband and Other" Baseline budget. In FY 2020-21, NLS held back \$36,817 of FY 2020-21 funds to be used in FY 2021-22 in anticipation of a second year of 50% reduction of CLSA funds.

All FY 2020-21 funds were expended in FY 2021-22.

4. List all the prior year CLSA rollover funds that were not spent in FY 2021-22 for your System and the fiscal year they pertain to.

All prior year CLSA rollover funds have been expended.

5. Is your System planning to roll over any FY 2021/2022 CLSA funds to FY2022-23? Please provide the amount and the reason the funds will be rolled over.

\$94,362 of FY 2021-22 CLSA Baseline funds will be rolled over to FY 2022-23. The funds are derived from slight underspending for local costs, as well as funds allocated for future purchases, which were not utilized.

6. What related non-CLSA activities were provided for C&D?

NLS is a 40-member cooperative system and covers a vast amount of geography and wide diversity of resources.

The ILL/Link+ contracts that are in place at this time will allow NLS Link+ members the opportunity to review additional ILL options and identify long-term and sustainable means of continuing to improve and enhance resource sharing among all member libraries. Member libraries use local funds to support Link+ and other resource sharing.

One member library used local funds to subscribe to enki, a shared eBook platform.

Libraries use local funds to support shared collections such as OverDrive, Bibliotheca Cloud Library, and the statewide Palace eBook-for-All project.

Tutoring Project

Every internet connected Californian will soon be able to access live, 24/7 online tutoring and homework help in all K-12 subjects. The passing of AB 128 by the California State Legislature enabled the California State Library to partner with the Pacific Library Partnership in bringing this service to all CA Public Libraries. All

California public libraries will be able to offer Brainfuse's online tutoring and homework assistance service, HelpNow, to their users for two years at no cost. Every California student, with or without a library card, will have access to 24/7 online tutoring in core K-12 subjects. Spanish language tutors will be available as well as tutors fluent in Mandarin, Cantonese, Vietnamese, and Tagalog.

FY21-22 Public Libraries Survey

The portal for data submission opened September 1, 2022. Instructions, a blank excel template of data elements, the recording of the August 23rd information session, and other helpful documents are available on the <u>State Library's statistics page</u>. Submissions are due no later than November 4, 2022.

California State Library Parks Passes

21,000 additional parks passes are currently at the printer! I will send an update with a shipping date and other information soon, but Parks currently estimates end of October. All libraries will be getting either what they requested or more, and can hold passes back to be replacements, rather than waiting for Parks to ship a replacement. You can begin planning marketing, programming, and outreach to get the passes into the communities that may face park access barriers now. I hope the <u>updated toolkit for the Parks Pass program</u> is on the CSL website, with links to flyers, circulation guidelines, and more are useful – please let me know how I can help. The Evaluation Toolkit now has a <u>Spanish version of the survey</u>.

Circulation statistics are due by **October 21**. An email has been sent to your PLS submitter with login info. Please submit data for July, August, and September. Note that I have changed the holds question – rather than cumulative holds, please just report the number of holds you currently have on all passes.

The State Parks Foundation is donating free 500 nature backpacks for libraries to circulate in their communities. The backpacks would be free of charge to you, and contain durable outdoor observation gear (ie binoculars, hand lens, compass, etc), nature guides, a clear plastic pouch with information inside, and a branded luggage tag. You would add them to your collection and set your own circulation guidelines. The only reporting requirement would be a survey 6

months after distribution that would ask for feedback on the program and circulation numbers. To apply to receive the free backpacks, <u>please fill out this form</u> by **October 15**.

Building Forward Infrastructure Funding for California Libraries

The first round of applications for this program closed on March 21, 2022. See the Governor's press release from **Tuesday**, **September 13**: "The 234 projects in this initial round of funding under the Building Forward Library Improvement Grant Program range from \$14,300 to \$10 million and include efforts to make libraries safer and more accessible, including their ability to be cooling centers for underserved communities. The City of Porterville, whose only library was destroyed in a 2020 fire that took the lives of two firefighters, will receive \$7.2 million." First priority for grants was given to the state's least-resourced communities and projects that address long-delayed critical life and safety facility needs including seismic safety, heating and air system replacement, building security, and improved Americans with Disabilities Act accessibility. eBooks for All CA

The LSTA eBooks for All grant program is now accepting applications! We have allocated \$1.25 million in LSTA funds to support collection development grants inside of the statewide collection. With these grants, your library or library collaborative will be able to guide and develop a collection that is accessible to all public libraries across the state. Further details on the project, including how to apply, can be found here.

The deadline to apply is December 9th at 5 pm.

If your library is not signed up to take advantage of this project, please be sure to do so soon, as the funding for onboarding is due to expire before the year ends. Please contact us at ebooksforall@library.ca.gov or casupport@thepalaceproject.org if you would like to sign up. In order to participate in this grant, your library must be onboarded onto Palace. If your library is presently on the eBooks for all platform, know that there are no hosting or server maintenance fees required.

When you make your existing local or cooperative collections accessible inside of Palace, they are not shared with the statewide collection. Your users will inherit the sharing permissions from your other eBook providers inside of the Palace app.

Even if you don't submit a grant application, every public library in California can participate in the statewide "eBooks for All" project. Full details can be found on the State Library's e-book page. Joining is as simple as emailing casupport@thepalaceproject.org and saying, 'My library is interested in joining.' The project implementation team will take it from there.

California Library Connect

The California Library Connect Program grant (formerly the High-Speed Broadband in California Public Libraries) is now live and accepting applications: https://californialibraryconnect.org/ - libraries may apply for grants to cover eligible IT/network infrastructure equipment and expenses, as well as the first-year costs of upgrading or installing a new high speed Internet circuit. This program also supports California public libraries by connecting them to high-speed internet through the California Research and Education Network (CalREN) — a high-capacity public-sector broadband network. Since 2015, California Library Connect has connected over 90 percent of its public library jurisdictions. California Library Connect is supported through the partnership of the California State Library, CENIC, and CTC Technology & Energy.
